MESSAGE FROM THE DIRECTOR

The past year of Future Leaders has seen a level of rapid change like never before. Summer 2019 kicked off with yet another successful Future Leaders Programme, in which a record 23 students from various schools around the island were officially inducted as Future Leaders.

Simultaneously, after having previously announced in January that a new partnership had been launched with Brandon Hall School, seven of the 2018 cohort of Future Leaders attended Brandon Hall Atlanta, where they participated in the Global Leadership and Social Entrepreneurship Summer Program. This marked our first ever international offering. The Future Leaders made such an impression at Brandon Hall that the school's President, Dean Fusto, made a commitment that in return, some of his students would visit Bermuda - with an ambitious deadline set for later in that same year. So said, so done - and in November 2019 a group of 12 students from Brandon Hall Atlanta visited the island for the purposes of voluntourism and cultural immersion, where they were hosted by Future Leaders Bermuda in what is set to become an annual cultural exchange between the two organisations.

Beyond expanding our international partnerships, our focus this past year has been on increased engagement and support for our existing Future Leaders. We no longer want to engage in the practice of onboarding new students, challenging them for three intense weeks, and then saying our goodbyes: we are now a community and family of dedicated students and mentors, and want to maintain ongoing support and foster closer ties for years to come. As such, we also held our first ever Future Leaders reunion where Future Leaders '17, '18', and '19 got the chance to connect and engage with each other for a friendly game of bowling.

None of this would have been possible without the support of our newly formed Future Leaders Executive Committee: Russell Lister, Alicia Kirby, and Sinae Smith are all dedicated and passionate young Bermudians who came on board in the last quarter of 2019 with a view toward increasing our organisational capacity and preparing Future Leaders Bermuda for stable growth after three successful years. To this end, Future Leaders Bermuda formally submitted an application for charity status which was granted in November 2019.

We are now proudly Bermuda registered charity #1009. With the support of a dedicated team and registered charity status to match, we had a number of exciting initiatives planned for 2020.

MESSAGE FROM THE DIRECTOR

In addition to an official charity launch set for March, some of our plans for 2020 included a Future Leaders Monthly Mentorship Club, expanded opportunities with Brandon Hall School Atlanta, an Alumni Network and Mobile App, and even a new Global Partnership with an organisation in Ghana, West Africa. We were extremely excited at the prospect of expanding existing partnerships and pursuing new opportunities for the benefit of our Future Leaders.

Then, on March 11, 2020 - a few days short of our expected charity launch date - the Novel Coronavirus Disease was declared a pandemic by the World Health Organization. As an organisation, we have had to pivot and of course, a number of these initiatives have been placed on hold. In light of the uncertainty, we also did not open registration for new Future Leaders over the spring period. On June 22nd, three years since we first launched the Future Leaders Programme, we announced the sad news that our Summer Induction Programme would not run this year while we examine the fallout and adhere to government guidelines surrounding public events. This means that there will be no 2020 class of Future Leaders. Sad times! On the bright side, one factor in our decision not to accept a new intake of students is our desire to do more to support our current Future Leaders in light of recent events, and as a result we are considering the best way to move forward and care for their wellbeing.

Overall, no one could have predicted the impact recent events would have had on the world - but everything has had to be completely reimagined and we are still navigating the crisis and its fallout, coupled with a world in protest, as this report is being written. In a time like this, I could not ask for a better team; and indeed could not be more grateful that we had been prepared as an organisation to respond adequately to the rapidly changing needs of our Future Leaders whilst preparing ourselves for future growth.

We are proud of where we are today despite the challenges ahead. We remain flexible as an organisation with a young, vibrant leadership team and will continue to adapt and pivot as necessary in accordance with the rapidly changing times.

We hope you are all safe and well and we thank you for your continued support as we navigate the current landscape.




PROGRAMME HIGHLIGHTS

INTERNATIONAL OUTREACH

As a result of a partnership between Future Leaders Bermuda and the Brandon Hall School in Atlanta Georgia, seven Future Leaders from our 2018 group attended the schools Global Youth Leadership and Social Entrepreneurial Studies program. This was a 3-week boarding experience where Future Leaders spent learning about philanthropy, marketing and research whilst enhancing their leadership and public speaking skills. Similar to our local program, the Brandon Hall School hosted rigorous and challenging daily schedules including community service, workshops, activities and several special guest speakers. At the beginning of the

program, students had to

research the Sustainable Development Goals (SDG's) and choose the global issue that they were most passionate about. For the rest of the program, the students were tasked with creating a product or organisation that would most effectively assist in ending their chosen issue. At the end of the program, the students were required to give a presentation to an audience pitching their ideas. Future Leaders' chosen global issues to tackle ranged from climate change to different forms of inequality.



Upon their return home, Future Leaders Jaiden Furbert-Jacobs and McKenzie-Kohl Tuckett decided to start their initiatives locally. Jaiden founded 441Ocean aiming to protect Bermudas environment. McKenzie founded Girl (Em)Power, an organisation aiming to promote the education, empowerment and equality of women.





The students thoroughly enjoyed their time at Brandon Hall. Their positive opinions about their expereinces have re-opened the opportunity for other Future Leaders to participate this summer. Additionally, in an effort to support our vision to, "Empower passionate young leaders" Future Leaders extended the Brandon Hall

Only three months after the idea was suggested, 11 students from the Brandon Hall School flew from Atlanta to Bermuda for a week-long, cultural exchange. The students were welcomed with a jam-packed schedule with activities including a Taste of Bermuda culinary experience, assisting at the Salvation Army's Emergency Housing Complex and assisting in painting the 'Gombey's in the Gardens' mural at the Gombey Festival.

FUTURE LEADERS MENTORSHIP CLUB

Each year, when we receive feedback from our Future Leaders, many students mention their desire to continue the program throughout the school year. After some consideration, we are looking to book a location each month to engage in a fun activity with all of our Future Leaders in a safe and wholesome environment. We will have a presentation from a community mentor or team member on a variety of life-skills topics - such as resume building, stress management and scholarship applications.





We are considering the idea of developing a mobile iOS/Android app which will allow Future Leaders to stay connected. The app would be exclusive for Future Leaders and allow them to discuss recent

events and hot topics and stay up to date on upcoming opportunities. They can also request meetings with Future Leaders mentors to get advice, recommendation letters and other support. Once a Future Leader, always a Future Leader! No matter where in the world you are.

STUDY ABROAD AND GLOBAL PARTNERSHIPS

We're on a mission to connect Bermuda with the rest of the Caribbean and Africa.

In addition to our annual trip to Brandon Hall Atlanta's Global Young Leaders Conference, we are also involved in two other partnerships with organisations in Trinidad and Tobago and Ghana which will allow Future Leaders to participate in cultural exchange and meaningful learning experiences.

Next summer, we'd like to take a group of mature Future Leaders for a cultural exploration tour in Ghana for an eye-opening experience and life-changing educational journey. Students will study pre-colonial history, leadership and life skills- all while learning about the local language and culture. Students will also participate in regular community service by tutoring students in English.


